Ideas to improve art shelves in order to provide a variety of options while meeting the art standards

- ★ Provide a variety of media: oil pastels, chalk pastels, bingo dotters, tempera vs. acrylic paint, water color paint, crayons, pencils, markers
- ★ Always provide collage tray where materials would be switched out (glue bottle and paint brush)
- ★ Always provide free drawing
- ★ Purchase books about artists and/or styles of art to heighten lessons and broaden knowledge
- ★ Always provide playdough and tools
- ★ Always provide an artist or style of art per month (see art 3yr cycle)
- ★ Conduct a meeting with the art teacher 2-4 times per year to provide a check-in, ideas, and support.
- ★ Acquire the bulletin board at the entrance of the building for displaying CH works.
- ★ Having the ability to use the art room's space

In kindergarten, artistic foundations focus on introducing basic art elements and concepts in a playful and engaging way. This includes exploring color, shape, line, texture, and form, encouraging creative expression through various art activities and materials. The goal is to foster a love of art, develop fine motor skills, and nurture imagination and self-expression.

Key Areas of Focus:

Elements of Art:

- Line: Introduce different types of lines (straight, curvy, zig-zag, etc.) and how they can be used to create drawings and patterns.
- Shape: Explore both geometric shapes (circles, squares, triangles) and organic shapes (shapes found in nature).
- Color: Introduce primary colors (red, yellow, blue) and how they can be mixed to create secondary colors. Discuss color attributes like
 hue, value, and intensity.
- Texture: Explore the feel of different materials and surfaces (smooth, rough, bumpy, etc.) through hands-on activities.
- Form: Introduce the concept of 3-dimensional shapes (like spheres, cubes) and how they can be created through modeling with clay or playdough.

Materials and Techniques:

- Provide a variety of art materials like crayons, markers, paint, playdough, and collage materials.
- Encourage experimentation with different tools and techniques (finger painting, sponge painting, etc.).

Creative Expression:

- Provide opportunities for open-ended art experiences where children can freely express their ideas and feelings.
- Encourage storytelling and imaginative play through art.

Visual Narrative: met with books

- Introduce the concept of creating a visual story through art.
- Help children understand how artists use visual elements to communicate ideas.

Constructive Feedback:

- Offer positive and encouraging feedback to help children develop their artistic skills.
- Focus on the process of creating art rather than solely on the final product.

In essence, kindergarten art education lays the groundwork for future artistic endeavors by introducing foundational concepts, encouraging creative exploration, and fostering a positive attitude towards art.
